Chair Taniguchi and Members of the Committee:

I am writing in strong support of the nomination of Judge Katherine Leonard to the position of the Chief Justice of the Hawaii Supreme Court.

Judge Leonard is highly qualified for the position. Judge Leonard had a brilliant academic career. She almost certainly finished near the top of her class at the William S. Richardson School of Law. She was selected for membership on the law review on the basis of her grades (an honor), and then was selected by her peers as the law review's Editor-in-Chief -- a singular honor. She won many awards at the law school, including for the highest grade in many classes. In addition, she had the very singular distinction of, while a law student, co-authoring an article in the law review itself -- Summary Judgment at the Crossroads: The Impact of the Celotex Trilogy, 12 UHILR 1 (1990) (Professor Eric Yamamoto was the principal author). Judge Leonard also won the McKay Moot Court competition while in law school.

Following law school, Judge Leonard was a law clerk at both the Hawaii First Circuit Court and the Hawaii Supreme Court for Justice Robert Klein -- the latter also an honor as well as significant excellent experience, especially for litigation and

future judicial service, including, of course, on the Supreme Court.

Following her clerkships, Judge Leonard worked for more than fifteen years as an associate and then a litigation partner at one of Hawaii's oldest, largest, and most prestigious law firms -- the Carlsmith Ball firm. Judge Leonard made a mark and reputation as an excellent, ethical litigator, who was capable of successfully handling very complex cases. She became a member of her firm's compensation committee and a vice-chair of the litigation section. Among her accomplishments was being the primary author of the Campbell Estate termination plan, which affected a great many employees and billions of dollars in assets.

Judge Leonard has also spent more than two and one-half years as an associate judge of the Intermediate Court of Appeals, where her opinions reflect a judge who cares deeply about the law, the facts, and precedent. Her opinions are clear, concise, well-written, and cogent -- exactly the kinds of opinions that should be written by our appellate judges.

Judge Leonard has been a member of the American Judicature Society for thirteen years, where she has actively participated in and led various important committees. For several committees, she has been the reporter, which means she did much of the hard work.

Judge Leonard's reputation is one of hard work, superb legal ethics, excellent writing skills, and as a keen, thoughtful, and brilliant thinker and attorney. She is far more than "qualified" to be the next Chief Justice of Hawaii's Supreme Court -- she is superbly qualified, both to be an excellent jurist and an excellent leader of the judiciary. I respectfully ask the Committee to favorably report her nomination to the full Senate.

Chair Taniguchi and Committee Members:

I support the nomination of Katherine G. Leonard to be the Chief Justice of the Hawaii Supreme Court. I did not know Judge Leonard before she was named to the Intermediate Court of Appeals ("ICA") as an Associate Judge. During her term on the ICA, I have had a chance to read all of her opinions dealing with criminal cases. I have found her writings to be scholarly and fair. They have been well-written and very valuable in providing guidance to the litigants and to the lower courts.

I have only engaged in a few informal conversations with Judge Leonard. On those occasions, she has been very personable and knowledgeable about the criminal justice system and the challenges that the public defenders face on a daily basis. I have come to greatly respect Judge Leonard's legal abilities and intellect.

I have no reason to doubt that Judge Leonard will serve with distinction as Hawaii's Chief Justice. For those who might question Judge Leonard's lack of administrative experience, I would suggest that, to cite such a reason for opposition to her nomination, would hold Judge Leonard to an unfortunate "double standard." While previous Chief Justices Lum and Moon were confirmed by this body without any serious questions being raised regarding such a lack of experience, suddenly, some now choose to assert the amorphous "lack of administrative experience" to oppose Judge Leonard's confirmation. In the absence of very specific, verifiable deficiencies in this area, I would assert that the use of such vague criteria has traditionally been used in the construction of the proverbial "glass ceiling" to keep qualified female candidates from high positions in government and corporations.

Judge Leonard has achieved much in her legal career. She has been a productive and fair jurist on the ICA. In my short acquaintance with her, I have developed respect for her both as a judge and a person. I support her nomination without hesitation.

The Board of Directors of the Hawaii State Bar Association appreciates Suzanne T. Terada the opportunity to comment on the qualifications of Katherine G. Leonard Calvin E. Young for the position of Chief Justice, Supreme Court, State of Hawaii.

In evaluating judicial nominees, the HSBA Board utilizes a modified version of the American Bar Association Guidelines for Reviewing Qualifications of Candidates for State Judicial Office. These Guidelines include the following criteria: integrity, legal knowledge and ability, professional experience, judicial temperament, diligence, financial responsibility, and public service, collegiality and writing ability. The HSBA Board's rating system includes the categories of "qualified" and "not qualified."

As part of its procedures for evaluating and taking positions on judicial and executive appointments, the HSBA Board utilizes a subcommittee of HSBA Board to review materials presented by the nominee and input from members. The subcommittee is also tasked with checking references and contacting others who have knowledge of the nominee's experience and qualifications. The full Board reviews the materials prepared by this subcommittee, the complete materials submitted by the nominee and members and conducts an interview of the nominee.

Taking into consideration all of the information presented by and about the nominee and an interview with the nominee, the vote of the Board of Directors of the Hawaii State Bar Association found Katherine G. Leonard to be unqualified for the position of Chief Justice, Supreme Court, State of Hawaii.

Hawaii Women Lawyers (HWL) respectfully urges your Committee to join us in supporting the confirmation of Associate Judge Katherine Leonard as the next Chief Justice of the Hawai'i Supreme Court.

HWL is a nonprofit organization of men and women attorneys. For over 35 years, HWL has remained committed to a mission to improve the lives and careers of women and children in Hawai'i.

The purposes of HWL, as set forth in our Articles of Incorporation, are clear and focused: to (1) improve the status of women in the legal profession; (2) increase the number of women attorneys in positions of authority and responsibility; (3) promote the advancement of all women; (4) provide educational, instructional, and training activities for the advancement and mutual enrichment of women attorneys; and (5) maintain communications with other women's organizations in order to achieve HWL's purposes.

HWL supports *qualified women lawyers* who seek careers serving as judges in the judicial branch of government, locally and nationally. Increasing opportunities for, and improving the visibility of, qualified women in the judiciary are important goals for HWL.

Judge Leonard's achievements throughout her impressive multi-faceted legal career spanning 20 years emphasizes excellence and mastery of complex subject matters, demonstrated particularly in the competitive private sector where she was a successful partner in complex commercial litigation at one of the largest and oldest firms in Hawai'i.

Additionally, Judge Leonard taught Environmental Law as an Adjunct Professor at the William S. Richardson School of Law.

Judge Leonard has also been active in substantive HSBA programs, including being a Vice President of the Bankruptcy Section in 2003. Judge Leonard's intelligence, impressive work ethic and ability to deliver results for demanding clients will serve her well in her ability to analyze and administer sound judicial decisions in the most complex legal disputes and controversies that will have an impact throughout the State.

Judge Leonard has a passion for making innovative improvements that positively impact the entire profession, as demonstrated by her being a Founding Member of the Hawaii Chapter of the American Judicature Society. Additionally, she was the Chair of the Hawai'i Access to Justice Commission's Hawai'i Rules of Professional Conduct Rule 6.1 Task Force (which encourages Hawaii attorneys to provide pro bono legal services to people in need). Judge Leonard's involvement as a volunteer stretches back to the 1990s when she volunteered for a number of projects with Hawai'i Lawyers Care, nka Volunteer Legal Services of Hawai'i.

At home, Judge Leonard lives a full and balanced life as a wife and mother of three children.

In the community, Judge Leonard is very active as a parent supportive of Boy Scout activities, including taking on leadership roles as an Assistant Scoutmaster, Assistant Cub Scout Den Leader, and active Cub Scout Pack Committee member participating in troop meetings, camping, hiking and other family-oriented activities.

Judge Leonard has demonstrated not only an approach to living a well-rounded, full-filling and balanced personal work-family life, but also she has successfully led and brought people together, at work, at home and in the legal community.

She may not be well known and she does not have a track record that leaves a clear leaning one way or another. If confirmed, Judge Leonard will have many critics watching her so that she will have an opportunity to administer the law with authority, objectivity and dignity.

HWL endorses her appointment because our mission supports adding qualified women lawyers to the judiciary as essential, more now than ever. Allowing qualified women lawyers to advance affirms our commitment to ensuring the law and culture around lawmaking has a direct positive impact on the lives of women and their families, so that women can know when seeking justice they are not relegated to be judged and to accept decisions from above, from predominately traditionally powerful male-dominated tribunals and committees.

Judge Leonard has the legal talent and capacity to refine her delivery in ways that will command respect from both men and women throughout the community. HWL urges that she will be motivated to leave a positive legacy for the greater good.

HWL is greatly concerned by a range of criticisms leveled at Judge Leonard's qualifications released in the media confusing the public that minimum requirements of "administrative experience" and "judicial experience" exist, and harsh critics suggest Judge Leonard is lacking in both. It needs to be emphasized that even for U.S. Supreme Court Justices, there is no such minimum requirement, even though such experience may be valuable. Something is dangerously wrong with a selection process that finds a person "unqualified" by allowing opponents of a candidate to create and emphasize "new" requirements for a public position midway during the proceedings.

Additionally, HWL is also very concerned about a selection proceeding being contaminated when personal opinions about a candidate's personality, conduct or style may find their way to the media or to the bar association leadership without specifics, particularly when it appears different standards are being applied to women than to men, even when such biases may be subconscious and unintended. Professional women who are tough, committed, serious, and effective, still struggle with being subjected to different, and often heightened, scrutiny because of their gender. This is exactly why it is critical to have qualified women at all levels of authority and leadership, including the top leadership post in the Judiciary.

We ask the Senate to advance Judge Leonard's nomination by recognizing that her extensive and experience throughout her professional and personal lifetime qualify her to be an extremely competent and successful leader of the highest court of the State and to allow her to be confirmed as the first woman Chief Justice.

I offer the following strong endorsement of Judge Katherine Leonard to the position of Chief Justice of the Hawai'i Supreme Court. At the outset, over the last 36 years of practicing law in Hawai'i, I have personally known and argued cases before every Supreme Court Justice since William Richardson. Judge Leonard has the highest personal character for integrity, honesty, legal knowledge and ability. Her professional skills involve her long and successful careers both as a practicing attorney and as a jurist. Members of the Committee on Judiciary and Government Operations:

I write to express my strong support for the nomination and appointment of Associate Judge Katherine Leonard as the next Chief Justice of the Hawai`i Supreme Court.

As a successful partner at one of the largest and oldest firms in Hawai`i, a founding member of the Hawaii Chapter of the American Judicature Society, the Chair of the Hawai`i Access to Justice Commission's Hawai`i Rules of Professional Conduct Rule 6.1 Task Force (which encourages Hawaii attorneys to provide pro bono services to people in need), and a mother of three children, Judge Leonard has demonstrated not only the ability to successfully lead and bring people together, but also a strong commitment to the improvement of the Hawai`i community.

I have learned of recent opposition by at least one attorney in the legal bar to the appointment of Judge Leonard as the Chief Justice. While each person is entitled to his or her opinion, I hope that the Senate will view these comments in the vein that they may have been provided. Contrary to what may be stated, everyone, including myself, has an agenda and a perspective from which we form our opinions. I suspect that the appointment of a complex commercial litigation attorney as the next Chief Justice may invoke some concern in the minds of attorneys who largely practice plaintiff's personal injury, criminal defense work, and/or plaintiff's civil rights claims. I suspect that much of the opposition is driven by the concern for the political philosophy of Governor Lingle and, therefore, her corresponding choice as Chief Justice.

Contrary to the recently expressed concerns, Judge Leonard has the administrative skills necessary to be the next Chief Justice. For example, Judge Leonard authored the termination plan for Campbell Estate, which successfully transferred, organized and directed over \$2 billion in assets. As you may know, the wrap-up of this trust was incredibly complex and involved the supervision of numerous people, issues and assets. This type of complex, administrative experience will serve her well as the next Chief Justice.

That being said, I am very concerned by the possibility that a woman candidate will be treated differently than a male candidate for the position of Chief Justice. Frankly, it appears that a double standard is being applied to Judge Leonard. When Chief Justice Moon was appointed, he had no administrative experience prior to his appointment. How has this new criterion become an issue solely when a woman candidate is appointed to be the next Chief Justice? Likewise, I am very concerned that a male candidate is praised for being "tough" and having a "steadfast character", while a female candidate is viewed as having a "difficult temperament" and/or being "difficult to disagree with".

Those in the bar who may not have worked with or opposite to Judge Leonard – and have no personal experience or basis for opposing her appointment – seem to feel that because they do not know her, she must not be qualified. Respectfully, their lack of knowing her and/or being familiar with her qualifications does not equal or warrant the conclusion that she is not qualified. I encourage such people to educate themselves, rather than rely on hearsay or their ignorance of her credentials to claim that her appointment is unjustified, and/or claim that her appointment is merely an equal opportunity appointment, because she is a woman. I sincerely hope that Members of this Committee will not be swayed by comments that lack any basis in personal knowledge or experience with Judge Leonard, and, frankly, may rest in some form of subconscious sexism or discrimination. Indeed, such objections appear to be a thinly-veiled attack on the political philosophy of the Governor and reflect a sad day for Hawaii that a successful woman attorney and judge may not be viewed as sufficiently qualified to serve as our next Chief Justice, merely because she is a woman.

Lastly, while I am a Democrat and registered member of the ACLU, and do not agree with all of the positions taken by the Governor, my political philosophy does not affect my strong belief that Judge Leonard is extremely qualified and equipped with the skills necessary to serve as a successful Chief Justice of the Hawai'i Supreme Court. As an existing Judge and as the new Chief Justice, Judge Leonard must follow the rule of law and apply existing precedent. That is exactly what she has promised to do.

Chair Taniguchi and Members of the Committee:

I submit this testimony to support confirmation of Katherine Leonard as Chief Justice of the Hawai'i Supreme Court. I am sorry that I will be out of town and unable to testify in person.

I have what may be a unique perspective on Kate, because I have known her since literally the day she came to Hawaii - long before she was a lawyer. Kate moved to Hawaiii in 1983 (I have been a lawyer in Hawaiii since 1979) together with a childhood friend of mine. They called me from the airport and soon moved into an apartment near my home. Getting together with my old friend also gave me the opportunity to get to know Kate. At that time, she was a plant biologist who (as I recall) worked at a University of Hawaii plant nursery.

I remember with pleasure the times we spent together, especially when she and my other friend would play music – Kate is (or was at any rate) a talented mandolin player.

I was pleased to hear that she decided to go to law school. I always thought of her as smart, committed, hard working, and honest, a person who would a great lawyer. As we all know, that certainly proved to be true. I will not go over her accomplishments which others know better than I. I will say that we remained

friends and also crossed professionally from time to time. In one case she represented a local bank which was seeking payment from a partner and guarantor. I represented another person involved in one of the subject transactions. The issue was an exceedingly arcane one concerning the intersection of partnership and guaranty law. I thought it would be impossible to find law directly on point. The partner/guarantor's lawyers (a large law firm headed by one of the most aggressive and successful lawyers in town) did not find or cite any such law. But Kate found the perfect case and delivered a crushing win for her client.

We have also been on opposing sides. I particularly remember a federal case involving a very large secured transaction. Because of Kate's knowledge, judgment, and skill we were able to resolve the case relatively quickly, to the great advantage of both clients.

At all times, I found Kate to be extremely well prepared and zealous in representing her client, but courteous to counsel and the court and scrupulously fair and honest.

More recently, I had the pleasure of arguing a case in front of an ICA panel that included Judge Leonard. Her questions were important, pertinent, and showed a terrific grasp of the case - just what I would have expected. Her tone was courteous. (From my experience including this argument and watching 2 or 3 others I can't imagine how anyone could truthfully criticize her judicial "demeanor.") It turns out that we lost the case - Judge Leonard wrote the opinion that ruled against us. Although disappointed, I found her opinion to be thoughtful, well researched, and well written - as have been her other opinions that I read.

I unreservedly commend Katherine Leonard as a person worthy lead our courts. She has the personality, work ethic, intelligence, experience, and character necessary for the job. Please vote in favor of her nomination as Chief Justice of the Hawai'i Supreme Court.

My name is Lawrence C. Foster and I am writing in strong support of the nomination of Katherine Leonard to become the Chief Justice of the Hawaii State Supreme Court. I am the former Dean of and currently a Professor of Law at the William S. Richardson School of Law, but I am writing this testimony in my personal capacity.

I have been licensed to practice law in the State of Hawai'i for nearly thirty years. For over six of those years, I was involved in civil and commercial litigation. I also served for several years as a reviewer of the judicial performance of many of Hawaii's state court judges. I was also active for several years in the Hawaii Chapter of the American Judicature Society, a national organization dedicated to improving the quality and independence of America's judges.

I have known Judge Leonard since she first entered law school many years ago and have kept in touch with her over the years, so I believe I have some knowledge of her capabilities.

I strongly support Judge Leonard without reservations.

Over the decades, I have closely watched the judicial nomination process in Hawaii and supported or opposed several nominees, including those nominated by our current Governor over

the past seven years. During this time, I have always focused on what I believe are the two most important characteristics of a good judge: quality and temperament. A few others seem to focus on the political qualities of the nominee or the governor who nominated them: conservative/liberal, democrat/republican, etc.

Judge Leonard is a very bright, creative, and talented lawyer. In law school, she was always at or near the top of her class and she had an outstanding career in civil litigation at the Carlsmith law firm.

I also believe Judge Leonard has the requisite judicial temperament. In law school, she was an excellent member of the law school community and many of her classmates found her always willing to help. Also in law school, she was elected by her peers to be Editor-in-Chief of the University of Hawaii Law Review. This is a clear indication of the trust her classmates placed in her as a classmate and leader.

It is also important to note Judge Leonard's commitment to judicial independence. Judicial independence is the keystone to a strong, professional judiciary. Threats to judicial independence come from many directions these days in the United States. Kate was a "lawyer's lawyer," i.e., a lawyer who other lawyers, many with more years of experience, turn to for perceptive, sound and ethical legal advice. By her confirmation, the

Senate would insure that her abilities as well as her admirable work as an appellate judge would continue to be applied to the work of the judiciary on behalf of all of Hawaii and its citizens.

I have practiced law in Hawaii State Courts throughout the Islands for 34 years, 18 of those years with Judge Kate Leonard. I know she is one of the best legal minds in the State, and I know she has proper judicial temperament in her legal work. Her judicial experience started in law school and continues to this day. Observing judges as a UH law student, assisting Justice Klein as a law clerk and presenting cases to judges count as judicial experience. It is healthy for our Appellate Courts to have a mix of career private practice members and career public lawyer/judge members.

One of Judge Leonard's strengths is her years of presenting cases to the Courts. One of the most important judicial roles is administering justice in a manner that the parties and attorneys believe is credible and correct under the law. Judge Leonard knows from experience what it takes for a judge to achieve that and she does it.

Equally important for the unique position of Chief Justice is her ability to manage the entire judicial branch. 



Dear Chairman Taniguchi and Senators:

Recently I sent the attached statement to the President and Directors of the Hawaii State Bar Association ["HSBA"] opposing the nomination of Judge Leonard to serve as Chief Justice. I did so only after speaking to and obtaining the opinions of at least 40 other members of the Bar. They -- like I -- had significant reservations about the nomination to such an important position of someone whose minimal professional experiences, standing, and reputation do not appear to adequately qualify her for the important leadership position to which she has been nominated.

Since I communicated my views to the HSBA I have spoken with many more lawyers, judges, and non-lawyers -- most of whom have contacted me -- to convey their concerns about the appointment of Judge Leonard. Of those who contacted me several were her law school classmates, employees at her former law firm, and current or former Judiciary employees. Many of them related specific instances which give rise to their concerns. Because I have no personal knowledge of the incidents or circumstances that were related to me by other people I told all of them that I could not and would not relate or rely upon their experiences second hand, and I encouraged them to contact the HSBA and the Senate directly. I believe some of those people have written or called to report the information they related to me, but others are fearful and reluctant to come forward.

The most that I can conclude and convey from the communications I have received is that I am by no means alone in expressing my misgivings about the appointment of Judge Leonard to serve as the next Chief Justice of the Hawaii Supreme Court. And the most I would ask of you is that you investigate thoroughly and provide sufficient channels for members

of the public to comment reliably upon the nominee's qualifications before you act upon her nomination.

My opposition continues to be based solely upon Judge Leonard's lack of experiences that qualify her to be the Chief among five Supreme Court Justices and the head of the Judiciary Branch of the State of Hawaii. Her experience as a trial lawyer is minimal; she has no trial bench experience, and two years as an Associate Judge on the Intermediate Court of Appeals is a very limited period of exposure to the challenges that will be faced by the Judiciary and its leader in the coming years. I am not aware that Judge Leonard has distinguished herself as a writer, thinker, or leader. I do not see any evidence that she has the capacity to inspire her colleagues on the Supreme Court or judges and employees of the Judiciary branch of government. I do not anticipate that Judge Leonard will be viewed by a significant portion of the State Bar or the public with the admiration and respect that is due the Chief Justice of the Hawaii Supreme Court.

If Judge Leonard were nominated to a position of Associate Justice I would not be so concerned, and I would not be opposing her nomination. Unfortunately the Governor has passed over far more qualified applicants for the position of Chief Justice and now seeks to have you confirm a person whose qualifications simply are not self-evident. I respectfully disagree that the importance of appointing a woman or a graduate of the William Richardson School of Law warrant consideration of this particular nominee unless she is found to be qualified for the position by reason of her demonstrated experience, reputation, and judicial temperment.

I will be happy to amplify the foregoing and answer your questions when I appear to testify in opposition to the pending nomination.

I strongly oppose the nomination of Judge Leonard to serve as Chief Justice of the Hawaii Supreme Court, and I will do so publicly. As of today I have informally spoken to at least 40 other lawyers -- former presidents of the bar, active judges, retired judges, and many prominent and experienced practitioners whose integrity and judgment are above repute. All of them expressed reservations and concerns about this appointment. None of them disagrees with my assessment that by experience and temperment Judge Leonard is ill equipped and unqualified to serve in the position for which she has been nominated.

I certainly appreciate the significance of nominating a woman for this position as well as the fact that she is the first graduate of the UH Law School to be nominated to the Hawaii Supreme Court; however, I don't believe that when it comes to such a critical leadership position that quality should be sacrificed for misguided ideals of equal opportunity, and I say that -- as you know -- from the perspective of an experienced civil rights litigator.

Judge Leonard has had only two years of experience as an associate appellate court judge. I've read many of her opinions, and although I may agree with some and disagree with others, she has neither distinguished nor embarrassed herself through her brief judicial performance thus far. The problem is that other than those two years as an appellate judge, I and other members of the bar are not aware of any other experiences that might qualify her for the position to which she has been nominated.

I am not aware that Judge Leonard has any experience as an administrator let alone in any job equivalent to the leadership position for a branch of state government. I have represented clients and been involved in a significant number of personnel, policy, and other non-judicial issues and disputes in which I have dealt directly with Chief Justices and Directors and other Judiciary staff, so I am personally well aware of the variety and breadth of the responsibilities of the position to which Judge Leonard has been nominated, and I do not know of any reasons why she is qualified to serve in that position.

The Chief Justice must have the confidence and respect of the Judiciary and the bar, and very few -- if any of us -- have any reason at this juncture to afford Judge Leonard either, based upon her actual record and/or the absence of any track record. Indeed, I am informed from her own law school classmates and others who have known and worked with her that it is extremely difficult to talk to or disagree with her and/or to maintain mutually collegial and respectful relationships with her. I am hopeful that they will be encouraged to come forward and testify about their own actual experiences.

At this point in its history the Hawaii State Judiciary has many younger and newer judges and is confronting critical challenges for which experienced and capable leadership is essential. I see absolutely nothing in her qualifications that indicates Judge Leonard can or will provide that leadership as Chief Justice, and I am hopeful that the Bar Association will concur.

I write in strong support of Katherine Leonard's confirmation as Chief Justice to the Hawai'i Supreme Court.

I met Katherine Leonard when we entered the William S. Richardson School of Law over twenty years ago. Kate excelled inside and outside the classroom. In class, I marveled at her sharp mind, diligent preparation, and quick grasp of complex legal issues. Her most noteworthy extracurricular activity involved her position as Editor-in-Chief of the University of Hawai'i Law Review. As I served as the associate editor, we worked long hours alongside each other. It was in this role that early on I became intimately familiar with the enduring characteristics that will make Katherine Leonard an exceptional chief justice.

Kate has always possessed a unique combination of intellectual firepower, puritanical work ethic, and good old-fashioned common sense. She is an original thinker and a person who thrives when hard decisions are required. She possesses the easier said than done talent of piercing to the heart of a legal or factual issue. As an Intermediate Court of Appeals judge, Kate has displayed these talents through her prodigious output of thoughtful, well-reasoned decisions.

Kate was not born with a silver spoon. She was not endowed with a yellow brick road to success through connections. She has earned success the proper way – through hard work, brains, and perseverance. She has earned success with a "Can Do" vs. a "Can't Do" mindset.

While conventional wisdom held that the governor's choice for the next chief justice was preordained, Kate did not. Fundamentally in the legal system, there are no foregone conclusions. Kate had the self-confidence and "Can Do" determination to throw her hat in the ring. Kate's "Can Do" vs. "Can't Do" outlook may be her supreme quality for the position. This attitude will best serve Kate (and the State) in her administrative role as chief justice. Apparently, detractors point to Kate's lack of administrative experience as justification to torpedo her appointment. In my view, "Can Do" resolve, character, and work ethic are far more prescient indicia of success than what some consider a resume gap in a distinctive career.

I also understand that detractors claim Katherine Leonard lacks proper collegiality or temperament. I am unaware of any incident where an individual was maltreated or justice impeded by these amorphous concepts. While Kate is strong-willed, I have found her to embrace a collaborative approach to decision-making. Surely twenty years ago in law school and to the present, Kate has rubbed others the wrong way. But this comes with the territory in an adversarial judicial system. It comes with the territory when you are a person tasked with representing clients in contentious legal disputes or formulating high-stake legal opinions as an appellate judge. I find Kate good-natured and amiable, but being Ms. Congeniality is not necessarily a valuable attribute to head any branch of government. Oftentimes a decision-maker must make the call and the chips must fall. I believe Kate will in an even-keeled manner tackle issues and make informed decisions – even if unpopular. This is what leaders do.

Katherine Leonard is an honest, open-minded person. Her jurisprudential record demonstrates a philosophy rooted in case-by-case individualized justice. Her personal record demonstrates a capacity for hard-work and far-sighted thinking. Governor Lingle has made a wise choice in her appointment of Katherine Leonard as the next Chief Justice to the Hawai'i Supreme Court. She will be an outstanding chief justice for years to come.

AS CHIEF JUSTICE OF THE SUPREME COURT OF THE STATE OF HAWAI'I

Governor Lingle has selected, from among a number of qualified candidates, Katherine G. Leonard, Associate Judge of the Intermediate Court of Appeals, to succeed the Honorable Ronald T. Y. Moon as Chief Justice of the Supreme Court of the State of Hawai'i. I am pleased to add my voice to those supporting the nomination of Judge Leonard. I urge the Committee and the Senate to approve the nomination.

Before Judge Leonard was appointed to the bench, she was one of the state's leading civil lawyers. In her many years of practice, she represented a variety of clients in complex matters involving business and commercial disputes, and did so successfully and in accordance with the highest intellectual and ethical standards of our profession.

I have known Judge Leonard for over 10 years. Her practice as an attorney was, in many respects, similar to mine. When we appeared on the opposite sides of a case, Ms. Leonard was a determined, creative, and worthy adversary; when the interests of our clients were

aligned, Ms. Leonard was a welcome ally. In more recent years, I have witnessed her outstanding performance as an appellate judge.

Ms. Leonard's stellar achievements at the University of Hawai'i Law School (where she served as Editor-in-Chief of the Law Review and was the recipient of many academic honors), her years of experience in both private practice and on the bench, and her contributions to the profession and the community are, in many ways, apparent from a review of the materials which have been and will be submitted to this Committee. What may not be apparent – at least without a first-hand familiarity with the quality of her work – is the high level of scholarship and analysis that Ms. Leonard applies when addressing complex legal issues.

As a member of the Intermediate Court of Appeals, Judge Leonard's opinions have been thoughtful and comprehensive. She has brought to bear not only a common sense appreciation of how the law and judicial decisions affect the parties before the court, but also a recognition that the court's decision in a given case will influence its decisions in future cases. This quality is particularly important when considering a nominee for a position on the Supreme Court.

In those cases that the Supreme Court is required to or agrees to review, the Supreme Court is not merely the final arbiter of disputes – the final step in the judicial process; the Court's written opinions constitute the final statement of justice in matters before the Court and become the common law that guides all lower courts. It is therefore important that the person

appointed to the position of Chief Justice bring to that office both a high level of scholarship and

legal analysis and also an appreciation of how the Court's work affects Hawai'i's people, and that

those qualities be employed to achieve fair and just results in cases before the Court - and in

cases which may never reach the Supreme Court.

Judge Leonard has demonstrated, both in her many years of practice and in her

more recent tenure on the bench, the qualities that warrant elevation to the position of Chief

Justice of the Supreme Court.

I fully understand that the Committee will be conducting its own careful review

of the nomination of Judge Leonard. If the nomination of Judge Leonard is confirmed and she

is elevated to the position of Chief Justice of the Supreme Court, I am confident that she will

serve with distinction and that, as the Chief Justice – often referred to as the "first among equals"

- she will lead by example.

Ladies and Gentlemen:

I write to you as someone who served for many years on the HSBA Board of Directors. I have been actively licensed to practice law in Hawaii since 1990, and am a former president of Hawaii Women Lawyers. My views are my own, and I am not speaking on behalf of my law firm, or of any other organization.

Back in late 2007 when Katherine Leonard was nominated for the position of ICA Judge, I was on the HSBA Board and received a multitude of e-mails and phone calls from members of the legal community who knew the nominee personally, and who attested to her integrity, excellent intellect, fairness, extensive legal skills and breadth of litigation experience. In addition, we Board members reviewed her JSC application and the other materials presented to us, and participated in her excellent HSBA Board interview. As a member of the 2007 HSBA Board, I was satisfied that she met all of the legally established criteria, and that she had the requisite outstanding professional abilities, as well as a strong commitment to the rule of law and to the importance of an independent judiciary, and so I voted her "Highly Qualified" for that position. (Today there are only two HSBA categories: "Qualified" and "Not Qualified"). The Senate, of course, went on to approve her unanimously for the position of ICA Judge.

Now Judge Leonard's nomination once again comes before you for approval, and once again the Senate must determine if she meets the legally established criteria for the position for which she has been nominated. Those legal criteria are the *only* basis upon which the Senate may make its determination.

It does not matter whether or not this candidate would have been someone's personal choice, or whether the candidate's political persuasions differ from one's own. Nor is it appropriate for Senators to give any weight to unsubstantiated statements lacking in objective evidence based on innuendo or multiple hearsay, and hiding under the cloak of "Judicial Temperament". And under no circumstances should this woman nominee be subject to gender bias or to a scrutiny about her professional or life experiences or purported behavior based on a standard that is stricter than any ever applied to her male predecessors.

I do not know Judge Leonard personally. I find, however, that I must support her nomination today, as I did as a 2007 HSBA Board member, not because she is a woman, but because she is a "Qualified" lawyer who meets or exceeds the legally established criteria for the position for which she has been nominated, Chief Justice of the Supreme Court of the State of Hawaii.

Dear Mr. Chair and Members of the Committee:

I am not here as a representative or spokesperson for any special interest group. I am testifying on my own behalf. It is based on an obligation to myself. For this statement, I am obligated to no other person.

IMPORTANCE OF THE SENATE'S CONSIDERATION

I am compelled to come forth and to speak up, because of the importance of your decision.

You, as members of the Committee, will be reporting your findings as to whether the full Senate should consent to the appointment of this Nominee as the next Chief Justice of the State of Hawaii.

This will be the fifth Chief Justice to sit since statehood. This Nominee's predecessors have served for an average of 13 years. The point is made because, if the Senate consents to this gubernatorial nomination, the Nominee will be sworn in to a ten-year term – which is two years longer than an elected governor is permitted to serve.

THE ROLE OF THE SENATE IN THE CONFIRMATION PROCESS

The Senate is tasked with the responsibility of consenting (or agreeing) with the Governor that the Nominee is suitable and otherwise acceptable to serve in the position of Chief Justice of the Judiciary — a co-equal branch of government.

Withholding your consent is not a rejection of the Nominee and it is not a rejection of the selection process of the appointing power. It would be your determination that the Nominee's record does not convince you of her suitability to be Chief Justice.

THE ISSUE

The issue here is not whether this Nominee should be confirmed as a justice. It would appear that she is qualified to be an associate justice of our Supreme Court.

The issue is whether this Nominee should be confirmed as the Chief Justice of the Supreme Court of the State of Hawaii.

The distinction between a Hawaii justice and Hawaii's Chief Justice is critical. A justice is one of five; the chief justice is one of one. The Chief Justice is the chief executive officer of the entire judicial branch of government and therefore the chief administrator of 1,800 employees. Hawaii's Chief Justice interfaces directly with the Executive and Legislative branches, formulates budgets and is the State's leading spokesperson for justice.

Unlike even the Chief Justice of the United States who does not have appointing authority, Hawaii's Chief Justice appoints judges to district court positions and appoints members to adjunct bodies of the judiciary.

THE NOMINEE LACKS LEADERSHIP AND ADMINISTRATIVE SKILLS

The Nominee has an inadequate record of proven accomplishments which would provide the Senate with sufficient bases to merit its consent.

The Nominee is considered an intelligent attorney. Indeed, she was editor of the law review. In the past two years, she has had judicial experience as an appellate judge of the Intermediate Court of Appeals. These are among some of her laudable qualities. But such achievements fall short of acceptable qualifications for the position of Hawaii's Chief Justice.

This Nominee should not be confirmed as the Chief Justice of the Hawaii Supreme Court for two fundamental reasons. First, the Nominee has no history of demonstrated administrative abilities. Second, the Nominee has yet to demonstrate leadership. These two key qualities are absent in this Nominee. Yet these two attributes – administrative skills and leadership abilities – which normally would be "givens" for a nominee to this position, are lacking. These two credentials are measurable: by past achievements or accomplishments. Here, there is little to measure.

Schooling and Gender are not Valid Criteria for Determining Suitability for this Position

The nomination of the Nominee is historic in two respects: if confirmed, the Nominee would be Hawaii's first female Chief Justice and the first graduate of the William S. Richardson School of Law to sit on the Hawaii Supreme Court.

Graduation from any particular law school is randomly related to leadership and administrative aptitude. The William S. Richardson School of Law provides its graduates with unique attributes and Hawaii residents are rightfully proud of the accomplishments of many of our law school graduates. But, a law degree from the William S. Richardson School of Law is not a certification that the Nominee has the needed administrative and leadership credentials to merit your consent – or agreement – of the appointive power's choice.

Regardless of the appointing authority's rationale for the selection of the Nominee – including the fact that the Nominee is a female – the Governor should have submitted a Nominee who has a history of demonstrated achievement.

LIMITED CREDENTIALS SUPPORTING A LEADERSHIP ROLE:

The Nominee's apparent lack of exposure to the membership of Hawaii's bar and especially to the Judiciary, an entity for which she would be its leader, creates difficulty for this Committee in evaluating her suitability for the position of administrative head.

One could argue that there are no criteria with which the appointment of a Chief Justice is to be determined. I respectfully disagree. The very title of the position - Chief Justice -- and the language in both the Constitution and the Hawaii Revised Statutes are instructive.

Article VI, Section 6 titled "Administration" provides that "[T]he chief justice of the supreme court shall be the administrative head of the courts." (emphasis added)

Section 601-2(a) of the Hawaii Revised Statutes states that "The chief justice shall be the administrative **head** of the judiciary...The chief justice shall **direct** the administration of the judiciary." (emphasis added)

In the simplest terms possible, the Senate is being asked to consent to the appointment of the leader of one of Hawaii's three branches of government. But the person (and I emphasize person) named has no proven leadership capabilities. This Nominee does not enjoy an earned or regarded reputation as a leader in any significant community organization or business entity. Partnership in a law firm – prestigious and respected as the firm is – does not equate to attributes of leadership.

My past and present colleagues – lawyers, judges, clerical staff and other personnel in the Judiciary - are asking a valid question: "What are the Nominee's credentials?" Has she been the head of an agency, a director on the board of a recognized and respected community organization, a person who has served in a prominent leadership capacity?

Any nominee for the position of Chief Justice who will be the leader of the entire third branch of government should not be confirmed merely because there is the promise of potential for success. It is not enough that a nominee has the potential to grow into the job.

In order to warrant your consent, a nominee must possess proven leadership skills. This Nominee has not demonstrated her capabilities of leadership for Hawaii's third branch of government.

Each of us knows what leadership is. Often, it is someone elected by one's peers. Oftentimes, a leader is someone who steps forward and assumes responsibility for others. A leader may be someone who fills a void. A leader is someone who inspires and motivates others for the common good of all. A leader often is someone who is willed into being as the leader by those who wish to follow. A leader can be many things to many people. A leader must have qualities and attributes that can engender confidence.

A leader should not be a divisive personality. A leader must have respect for all, especially for those in a subordinate position. Normally, a leader has the respect of those who follow. A leader takes blame and does not attribute fault to others. A leader must have the ability to instill confidence in those who are unwilling to take risks.

This Nominee comes with none of these credentials of a proven leader. She may have the potential for leadership, but the traits have yet to be demonstrated. Some proof is required before you give consent to such an important appointment. Does the Nominee possess those intangible and indescribable elements of leadership that must be possessed in order to be head of an entire third branch of the government?

The decision to place this Nominee in such an important leadership position is the choice between trusting and taking a chance on the one hand, or asserting your doubts and asking for a nominee with credentials relevant to the job assignment on the other hand.

As Senators, your prerogative is to refuse to consent to any nominee for this position, if the nominee has not compiled sufficient credentials as a leader in our community.

CONCLUSION

I request that you consider the foregoing observations in your deliberations. I respectfully suggest to you that this Nominee is not yet qualified to be the State of Hawaii's fifth Chief Justice in its fifty first-year history of Statehood.

I support the appointment of Katherine G. Leonard as the Chief Justice of the Supreme Court.¹

I am an attorney who has been licensed to practice law in this State since 1985. I practiced business litigation until 1998 and since that year have practiced almost exclusively in the area of family law. Although I never worked with Judge Leonard while she was a private practitioner, I believe I have insights that indicate the type of leader Judge Leonard could be if the Senate confirms her as the Chief Justice.

I attended a seminar at the Richardson School of Law on the matter of appellate practice. Judge Leonard was one of the panelists. Supreme Court Justice Paula Nakayama was a co-panelist. Chief Staff Attorney James Branham also participated, along with an attorney in private practice, Milton Yasunaga. In light of the presence of other panelists, Judge Leonard would have easily taken the assignment casually and barely prepared her remarks. Instead, she was very prepared and had an organized, methodical presentation that clearly was intended to impart concrete, useful information about effective appellate advocacy.

At that seminar Judge Leonard's opening remarks were revealing. She stated she was acutely aware of the fact that, for all intents and purposes, the ICA was the last opportunity for relief for many litigants, including parents who lost their

children to foster care. For that reason, she took very seriously her task of reviewing trial court decisions.

Clearly, Judge Leonard understood the gravity of her appointment. In addition, instead of "sitting on the laurels" of her appointment to an appellate bench and staying far from the madding crowd, Judge Leonard demonstrated a clear interest in taking affirmative steps to maintain and improve the services provided by the Judiciary.²

As the Committee is aware, many in our community have raised concerns about Judge Leonard's qualifications to serve as the leader of a co-equal branch of our government. I have confidence, however, that the Committee will remain focused on the tasks of weighing credible information and disregarding unsupported remarks, of evaluating Judge Leonard on her own merits instead of comparing her against individuals who were not appointed, and of critically examining whether positive and negative comments carry the taint of obvious or unwitting gender bias (such as characterizing conduct as positive when undertaken by a male but negative when undertaken by a female).

My name is John P. Dunbar, I am a resident of Maui County, having arrived in Hawai'i prior to Statehood. I am a Vietnam-era Veteran, having served Honorably for 20 years in the United States Navy and as member of SEAL Team. I have worked in business and performed thousands of hours of volunteer services during the past 20 years in Maui; I also have a passion for seeing Hawai'i, its government and the judiciary perform in a manner consistent with the best interests of our communities.

I am testifying today in opposition to the appointment of Judge Katherine G. Leonard to the position of Chief Justice of the Hawai'i Supreme Court. I do so and make any and all statement of my own volition; no person or persons asked me to testify and my motivation is based upon an understanding of the significant role of the Hawai'i Supreme Court Chief Justice and how the inclinations or, possibly, vagaries of the person selected may influence the jurisprudence of our State. I have studied the limited background information available on Judge Leonard, her qualification, her ties to the Carlsmith-Ball law firm [husband], her opinions, and I also believe that other eminently qualified persons exist in Hawai'i for potential nomination to the Chief Justice seat.

It is my understanding that Judge Leonard has served over two years on the Hawai'i Intermediate Court of Appeals, and allegedly has helped decide the merits of more than 400 appeals. "That's the No. 1 experience that will help me in this job," she said. She said she could not pick any of her opinions as particularly important because "every single case is important to the people in that case and who are affected by it." "I try to approach every single case the same way and give each case a fair and full hearing and analysis, so it's just hard for me to say one is more poignant or important than another."

Judge Leonard apparently declined to cite written decisions to illustrate her "moderate" philosophy, and Lawyers and other members of the legal community also say it's <u>problematical</u> to detect any trends or judicial leanings given the short time since the announcement of her appointment, though now I am compelled to cite a recent case which has drastically impacted *my* life. Judge Leonard was suppose to have reviewed this case as [as a three-judge panel member]. Her *rushed* signature is on the Summary Disposition Order "gifted" to me on Christmas Eve 2009.

Before there is any questioning of the Judge or myself regarding my case's legal outcome and whether, in fact, a miscarriage of justice is detectable, there is a part which must be added—in a graphic way, it details the incident that which is essential to any case and, in legal standards it is referred to as the "totality of the circumstances."

Almost six years ago to the day, I was brutally attacked on my own property by two misfit-inferior Maui police officers, one whom is a large African-American male weighing nearly 250 pounds; he had only months previously gunned down/murdered a local mother of three by shooting her in the head. The attack on me was not in any way provoked, though I had, subsequent to the attack, written two letters to the editor of the Maui News as a former federal law enforcement officer trained in use of force and deadly force.

No probable cause existed for any of the offenses I was alleged to have committed for the initial arrest, though I needed emergency treatment for injuries sustained in the [incomplete] arrest. The judge who convicted me, Joel E. August was just three years ago characterized by our Attorney General, Mark Bennett, as a judge having "poor judgment." This same judge made anti-military remarks during my sentencing and never denied, when questioned by me, that he had been under the influence of marijuana at the time of my bench trial.

I had no prior criminal history and at the time it was alleged by the police that I ran from them, I was on my own property, had a crippled hip for which I was scheduled to undergo full-replacement surgery in two months. The trial court judge further asserted that I had "run in rapid flight" when I was even corroborated by the police that had a need to "sit in a chair." Other unnerving events arose after the initial violations against me, including harassing police helicopter flights over my home and police cars parked above my property.

I, the Appellant pro se, had asked the Intermediate Court to determine a dispositive issue and review the same under the de novo legal standard: Whether an a conviction for "Attempted escape in the second degree" may be maintained absent a ["completed"] arrest. In this particular case, the trial court determined that the arrest was, in fact, unlawful and absent any probable cause and that the Defendant's conduct constituted "mere non-submission"; the prosecution had conceded that "[t]he arrest, although not yet complete, was still an arrest, and therefore, it was 'custody." However, in a non-jury trial the judge convicted the Defendant, me, of the [uncharged] offense of "Attempted escape in the second degree" and in the Summary Disposition Order signed by Judge Leonard the ICA affirmed the conviction. In State v. Ryan as cited in State v. Nakoa the Hawai'i Supreme Court stated "...this court relied upon the statutory definitions of 'custody,' HRS 710-1000(3), and 'arrest,' HRS 803-6(a), to clarify the definition of custody for purposes of the escape statute. We stated that '[t]he only question for our determination is, whether the defendant was then under 'arrest' within the meaning of HRS 710-1021 [escape statute] and HRS 710-1000(3), and agreed with defendant Ryan that 'the arrest for escape purposes must have been made in full compliance with HRS 803-6." Ryan, 62 Haw. at 100, 612 P.2d at 102-03." State v. Nakoa, 72 Haw. 360, 366, 817 P.2d 1060, 1064 (1991). The escape statute requires that the arrest be completed before the defendant is deemed to be in custody.

Justice Steven Levinson noted in his opinion in State v. Ketchum: "We agree with

the United States Court of Appeals for the Ninth Circuit that, "when determining whether an arrest has occurred, a court must evaluate all the surrounding circumstances, 'including the extent to which liberty of movement is curtailed and the type of force or authority employed." <u>United States v. Torres-Sanchez</u>, 83 F.3d 1123, 1127 (9th Cir. 1996) (quoting <u>United States v. Robertson</u>, 833 F.2d 777, 780 (9th Cir. 1987)).

Given the case facts and circumstances, the applicable Hawaii Revised Statutes and the relevant Hawai'i Supreme Court case law, it is perplexing and confounding to me [as perhaps it should be to the Senate Judiciary Committee] that an appeals court missed, overlooked, ignored, or perhaps deferred [a] case to its research staff. A second issue presented to the ICA clearly indicated that the "state of mind" requirement for the alleged offense had not been met by the court; and, further, University of Hawai'i Professor Virginia Hench, Director of the Innocence Project in Hawai'i, opined that the trial court Judge Joel E. August <u>illegally amended</u> the initial charge of "Escape" to "Attempted escape."

Please, Judge Leonard, what happened... you cannot simply say: "this is too complex of case to set forth the rationale in a nutshell." All of the essential ingredients are before you now.

Failures [or "mistakes"] by the judiciary, as I learned in a very hard way, may, if unchecked, eventually erode constitutional protections. Does Hawai'i's Constitution really—in the final outcome—afford greater protection than the same provisions enumerated under the federal Constitution? And how is all of this affect by the economy and other factors?

In his state of the judiciary address of January 27, 2010, Justice Moon said: "The cruel irony in these difficult economic times is that the demands on our courts intensify, and, unfortunately, no matter how much we are called upon to sacrifice in terms of court programs, salaries, benefits, and the like, nothing compares to the devastating impact that the current situation has and will continue to have on our citizen's access to justice." How would Judge Leonard deal with the circumstances of present and to what extent will ongoing challenges impact our citizens? Moon also assert that following Acts 202 and 145 "the new appellate process is working well and has yielded positive results."

For the moment, I implore Judge Leonard to provide a legal explanation for the miscarriage of justice which is inextricably linked to *her* court. I request this with due respect for the context of and purpose for this Confirmation Hearing—a determination of the judge's fitness to serve as our next Chief Justice of the Hawai'i Supreme Court. This is very significant and we [our Senators in particular] must not accept a cursory evaluation of that fitness. My proposal is not necessarily a novelty as confirmation hearings typically cite cases with which the nominee had involvement; thought it is a unique opportunity—a vehicle for discussion, if you will, and questioning at a time when this Committee is already lacking certain indicators usually evident at a confirmation hearing of this type.

In the case at bar, many questions of a constitutional nature can be opened and presented to Judge Leonard toward a better knowing of *her* philosophy, spirit and strengths with respect to appreciation for our State Constitution as it reflects the underlying Federal Constitutional and, of course, we might better fathom her abilities in the area of criminal law.

Moral and intellectual recognition of and belief in the Constitutional protections afforded individuals and groups is tantamount to effective interpretation and application of the laws and the statutes of our State.

We can really only discern how this nominee will perform by putting her to a tangible test to delve into and explore her approach to [a] specific case involving issues of a constitutional nature, her analysis and eventual conclusion.

Judge Leonard has *chosen* her responses—after being nominated—to be consistent with mainstream beliefs and expectations, but what really can be predict her "modest and moderate" conduct on the Hawai'i Supreme Court.

She says: "To me that means upholding the United States Constitution, the Hawaii Constitution, following the laws that have been enacted by the Legislature, the rules of the court and putting aside any of my personal feelings or opinions."

BUT, nowhere in Judge Leonard's words and expressions referring to her sense of confidence and ability to fill the position of Chief Justice, is there any mention of what may be one of Hawaii's most unique and coveted legal peculiarities and one which is highly relevant to the judiciary.

In the final days of the Hawaiian monarchy, the Kingdom of Hawai'i formally adopted the common law albeit with certain limitations to preserve Hawaiian customs and precedents. Today Hawaii remains essentially a common law jurisdiction.

The formal reception of the common law was achieved by means of a statute rather than by means of constitutional amendment. LAWS OF HER MAJESTY LILIUOKALANI, QUEEN OF THE HAWAIIAN ISLANDS, PASSED BY THE LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY AT ITS SESSION 1892, c. 57, § 5. The modern descendant of this statute—deeply imbedded in the roots of Hawaiian Culture and Law—is Hawaii Revised Statute § 1-1, and within this statute reference is made to "Hawaiian Judicial Precedent," which give the Courts of Hawai'i legal authority having the FORCE AND EFFECT OF STATUTORY LAW to make rulings favorable to Hawaiian Usage, Traditions and Practice.

I believe that the people of our present day Hawai'i must preserve this element and "tone of jurisprudence" (as referred to by Governor Lingle) by aiming to install a Chief Justice of, preferably, Hawaiian ancestry or one with stronger ethic ties to Hawai'i; certainly, in circumstances relating to Hawaiian cultural issues, having a Chief Justice of Hawaiian ancestry would likely result a sense or feeling among our Native Hawaiian peoples RESPECT for the values of their existence before, now and in the future. Hawaiian Judicial Precedent, Hawaiian Usage, Hawaiian Tradition and Practice all play a role in certain judicial decisions in Hawaii and this element of Hawaii's culture can best be preserved by a person with strong ethnic ties to Hawai'i.

As we know from the "Broken Trust," co-authorized by three persons of Hawaiian ancestry, including Federal Judge Samual P. King, the Hawai'i Supreme Court became involved in issues of ethics, integrity and politics. We should not have this conduct ever again and may the "Broken Trust" be installed and remain in the Chambers of the next Chief Justice as a reminder of what has passed.

The search must continue for someone eminently qualified is out there, and I therefore urge the people of Hawai'i to press their Senators, Representatives and the

Governor by calling now to stop the confirmation of a transplant from Wisconsin to serve as our highest State Court representative. This development would only serve to perpetuate the harms of American colonialism - or, in the words of U.S. District Judge Alan Kay, "the influx of Western civilization." Citizens of Hawai'i, please act now for the future.

Perhaps, today, Judge Leonard will clarify the situation at the appeals court level and she is welcome to use my case as an example. Needless to say, I am quite interested and will remain throughout the Hearing.

It somehow seems particularly appropriate at a time when we continue to mourn, to celebrate, and to greatly miss the cheerful presence of Chief Justice (ret.) William S. Richardson that an outstanding graduate of his Law School has been nominated to serve as Hawai'i's new Chief Justice. When I refer to our Law School as CJ Richardson's Law School, I mean much more than that we proudly bear his name. I mean, in fact, to suggest some of the many ways that Judge Katherine Leonard embodies CJ's vision and our great pride.

I also mean, for example, to incorporate CJ's abiding concern to afford opportunity to qualified people from all kinds of backgrounds, including to a young woman trained in science who came to Hawai'i and found work in an orchid tissue culture laboratory and then as a research lab technician in the Department of Pharmacology at the John A. Burns School of Medicine. I also wish to allude to an abiding commitment that CJ kindled— and did so much to sustain over the Law School's entire existence: that is, to provide a challenging and absolutely first-rate legal education to talented individuals from all kinds of backgrounds. From our very beginnings in 1973, we have enrolled more women than most other law schools and a very significant number of our most outstanding graduates are women. Therefore, it is also very apt that the first woman nominated to be Chief Justice in Hawai'i is Katherine Leonard, class of 1991.

Many people will recall that much has been made—as it should be—concerning the fact that President Barack Obama was the very successful president of the Harvard Law Review in 1990-1991. ("President" in this context is Harvard Law School's fancy way of saying editor-in-chief.) This prestigious leadership position is very challenging at any law school. Our leading scholarly journals in legal education are, somewhat surprisingly, still run by students. And any editor-in-chief faces the daunting task of leading a group of very smart, frequently opinionated, and—as lawyers-in-training—often somewhat argumentative peers in pursuit of the common goal of publishing tightly organized and well-supported scholarship.

It bears noting that for that same 1990-91 academic year, Kate Leonard, who was elected by her fellow students, served as editor-in-chief of Volume 13 of the University of Hawai'i Law Review. By all accounts, Kate performed exceptionally well in this very demanding role, which often involves convincing one's colleagues to do things they may not prefer to do and doing so without the benefit of any real carrots or sticks. In addition to Kate's obvious intellectual abilities and her skill at writing clearly and well, another aspect of her success is her unusual ability to focus while at the same time juggling many obligations.

With Kate's permission—and through the help of several of our excellent staff members—we dug out Kate's long-ago application to the Law School. (Weirdly enough, even in the 1980s, an applicant apparently still had to report her height and weight!) Kate explained in her application that she had needed to work as a salesperson, waitress, and office assistant while she attended the University of Wisconsin - Parkside, and at the same time she also had been directly involved in caring for a family member. And she added in her personal statement that "Community is an important part of my seeking enrollment in this law school" and she underscored the importance to her of "the richness and diversity of Hawai'i's people"—along with her hope to use law to address some of the pressing problems she enumerated.

In other words, Kate Leonard was the kind of student we seek from any kind of background and she became the kind of graduate of whom we are very proud. She also has demonstrated a wonderful willingness to remain involved with our Law School—recent examples include spending a good deal of time advising students about judicial clerkships as well as answering any and all questions posed by students after she sat at the Law School as a member of an Intermediate Court of Appeals panel that held a regular court session in our Moot Courtroom. It is further evidence of Judge Leonard's considerable renown within the legal community that she was chosen as the speaker at the end-of-year celebration last April for the student editorial board that put out Volume 32 of our Law Review.

In summary, it is a moment of great pride and a wonderful sign of the maturity of our still-young Law School that an outstanding graduate of the William S. Richardson School of Law has been nominated to the Hawai'i Supreme Court for the first time and that she has been named to serve as the Chief Justice. I strongly urge you to confirm Katherine Leonard.

Most notably, I understand that Judge Leonard helped develop and implement the termination plan for the Campbell Estate, which involved a multitude of diverse parties, attorneys, and advisors, as well as complex issues and assets. As an advocate, Judge Leonard exhibited a high degree of intellect and professionalism.

Judge Leonard's ability to balance a challenging litigation practice with her family life (she is married with three children) speaks volumes about her organizational skills.

I am particularly disturbed about the suggestion that Judge Leonard may not be qualified to serve as Chief Justice because she purportedly lacks "administrative experience" and the innuendos about her "judicial temperament." I am not sure that Chief Justice Ronald Moon had significant administrative experience before he was appointed nor does "administrative experience" appear to have been a criterion when Chief Justice Roberts was appointed Chief Justice of the United States Supreme Court. Therefore, this criterion should not be imposed upon Judge Leonard (though, as discussed above, she appears to have excellent organizational skills). As for expressed concerns about Judge Leonard's "judicial temperament," I hope that Judge Leonard is not being subjected to gender bias or held to a standard that is different from that applied to a male nominee. To the extent Judge Leonard might have been regarded as assertive or tough in her litigation practice, those traits are generally viewed as positive attributes when applied to a male candidate and should be viewed positively in a female candidate as well.

I want to make it clear that I am not supporting Judge Leonard as Chief Justice simply because she is a woman. I simply believe that this Committee should confirm Judge Leonard because she is qualified for the job.

As far as experience goes, I cannot think of anyone who is more qualified who will be fair to all litigants and treat attorneys and members of the public with dignity and respect.

I believe that Katherine will make an excellent Chief Justice and that she will not be obliged to any political or special interests influences. I believe that she will always strive to be well versed in the law and procedure. There are many challenges that await Katherine and the Hawai'I Supreme Court but she is an extremely bright and honest person who will be fair to both appellants and appellees regardless of their race, color, gender or financial background. She will be a great Chief Justice of the Hawai'I Supreme Court for years to come.

HSBA STATEMENT:

President Jones and members of the Board Hawaii State Bar Association

I strongly support the nomination of Judge Katherine Leonard as the next Chief Justice of the Hawaii Supreme Court.

In that regard, I object to the unwarranted comments submitted by Eric Seitz on July 26, 2010.

I have known Katherine "Kate" Leonard since 1989, upon my transfer to the William S. Richardson School of Law. We graduated together with the Class of 1991. During my two years as her classmate, I witnessed the emergence of her considerable legal skills.

As an oral advocate, Kate distinguished herself in the classroom. She had the temerity and confidence to "speak up" while the rest of us were hunched over our textbooks in a futile attempt to escape the Socratic Method. Her stated positions were well reasoned, firmly supported, and clearly delivered. In other words, she not only demonstrated a mastery of the law, but also the courage of her convictions. This trait alone set her apart from the rest of the class.

As Editor-in-Chief of the Law Review, Kate proved to be an effective and well-organized administrator who knew how to motivate authors to turn in drafts and rework them as necessary. I observed this talent firsthand as one of the authors published in the 1991 Law Review. I was impressed by her keen attention to detail and quickness of her intellect.

Over the next seventeen years, I watched Kate perfect her skills as one of Hawaii's top litigators. Again, my impressions were formed firsthand. While I did not personally square off against Kate in the courtroom, I watched her present oral argument. I also read various memoranda she authored in cases being handled by other members of my firm. The attributes that became evident in Law School served her well in her practice. She earned a reputation as a formidable adversary - hardworking and fearless. Litigation requires aggressive and passionate advocacy. Kate, as she had demonstrated in Law School, was not afraid to make her voice heard. Nonetheless, I have never witnessed, nor have I ever heard of any instance where Kate did not comport herself professionally in the rough and tumble world of litigation.

I have read several opinions authored by Kate regarding appellate matters in which I am involved. She has ruled both for and against positions advocated by my client. Her opinions show the same clear thinking and objective reasoning which I remember from Law School days.

I have the greatest respect and admiration for Eric Seitz. He (like Kate) has the courage of his convictions. However, I am baffled by the lengths to which he has gone to oppose her nomination. Certainly, he understands that attorneys who have tangled with Kate "the litigator" may still be smarting from having been bested in court. He also understands that Kate "the law student" has matured over her many years of active practice. No doubt professional and personal grudges have tainted the recollection of the law school classmates and others to whom Eric refers in his statement.

Unlike Mr. Seitz, it never occurred to me that Kate's nomination might relate to her gender and Law School affiliation, or to "misguided ideals of equal opportunity." This did not occur to me because Kate, above all other peer practitioners I have known over nearly two decades of practice, has earned her way to the top. Unlike Mr. Seitz, I have firsthand experience which tells me Kate has the temperament and discipline to lead the Court and streamline the appellate process.

There are very few people in this world of whom you can say: "this person was born to be a lawyer." Hod Greely, with whom it was my privilege to practice, was one. Kate is another. She shares the same instincts, agile intellect, and genuine curiosity that make a great litigator. I have absolutely no doubt that she can apply these remarkable gifts to forge the Supreme Court into an efficient and productive part of our judicial system.

In closing, I respectfully suggest that the HSBA consider three things when weighing the statement submitted by Eric Seitz:

First, with all due respect to Eric, it is entirely possible that he has taken Kate's measure and determined that he will not be able to wield much influence in the deliberative process if she is appointed.

Second, as an attorney, Eric knows that his representations about what other people have told him carry little if any evidentiary weight. Let those individuals to whom he refers "come forward and testify about their own actual experiences." Absent such corroborative testimony, Eric's statements along these lines can and should be disregarded.

Finally, virtually any candidate for Chief Justice is going to fall short in at least one category, whether it be trial, judicial, or administrative experience. Of these categories, administrative and judicial skills can be learned on the job. Litigation skills - and the hands on working knowledge of our legal system - cannot be learned from the bench. Kate brings with her the real life skills and perspective of someone who has lived and breathed the law as a practitioner. She has learned the art of compromise and negotiation. She knows the value of settlement. She will shine as our next Chief Justice.

I strongly urge the Board to support Katherine Leonard's nomination.

I am writing in reference to the Committee's consideration and confirmation of Gubernatorial Nominee, Katherine G. Leonard, as Chief Justice to the Supreme Court, State of Hawai'i. This letter serves as my written testimony to be submitted for the Committee's review in light of the upcoming hearing on Tuesday, August 3, 2010, at 9:30 a.m. in the State Capitol.

First, I would like to introduce myself. When Judge Leonard became an Associate Judge of the Hawai'i Intermediate Court of Appeals ("ICA"), another law clerk and I were the first to join her chambers. I worked with Judge Leonard for a total of eighteen months, the longest of any of her clerks. She was inducted into the ICA on January 31, 2008. A law clerk's terms ends in August, but Judge Leonard offered me another year in her chambers and I gladly accepted. My term ended in August 2009 and I am currently practicing insurance defense litigation with the law firm of Ayabe, Chong, Nishimoto, Sia & Nakamura, LLLP.

During my eighteen months, Judge Leonard and I had shared many exchanges on the law and on the cases that were before the ICA. No one will doubt her legal abilities, sharpness of mind, and intelligence. This testimony serves to describe the person in Kate Leonard that some may not readily see or recognize.

I have often described Judge Leonard as a person with two hats. There is the Kate Leonard at-work hat, and there is the Kate Leonard not-at-work hat. When she is wearing her "work" hat, she is focused, ambitious, and passionate about the law. Any person working for her will quickly realize that she is a perfectionist and demands the best from her fellow judiciary members. When we discussed cases on appeal, she would "grill" me on the facts and the law. I laugh about those moments because I knew that her stern manner of questioning was never a personal attack, but came from her serious concern for the parties in the cases and the ICA's impact on the law through its dispositions. It seems as if Judge Leonard puts her herself in both parties' shoes, listens to their arguments, and treats each case as if it affected her as much as the parties themselves. In sum, when Kate Leonard wears her work hat, she truly cares about hearing both sides of a case and making sure that her decisions are educated, sound, and fair. Sometimes, she appears tough on those she works with, but in my opinion, it comes from a good source.

I was taught that learning comes in three stages—the romance stage, the discipline stage, and the creative stage. To me, I believe Judge Leonard has just embarked on the last stage. In the first stage, Judge Leonard probably became enamored with the law when she entered law school. The romance stage is when a person feels excitement and fondness for the subject matter. In the second stage, I would guess that Judge Leonard disciplined herself and worked hard in private practice. That was the stage of challenges, the time when the romantic side of the law seemed less visible, but also the time when she gained great achievements. As to the third stage, I surmise she entered the creative stage when she became an ICA Judge. She has told me on more than one occasion that this job is "fun." The creative stage, from what I was taught, was when a person is able to expand and create new ideas, built upon the hard work gained during the discipline stage.

If she were to become Chief Justice of the Hawai'i Supreme Court, I have a strong feeling that her creativeness will pour out, that it will be her moment when she will exercise the best of her abilities. In light of what I have already said, I still think the lessons from the romance and discipline stages are still with her. She is still in love with the law, and she is still a hard worker.

Finally, I would like to end with a description of Kate Leonard when she wears her "not-at-work" hat. Most people who get to know Kate Leonard know that when you are talking to her about something other than work, she is a very warm person who enjoys the beauty of plants, who likes to cook, who will still sleep on a very cold, hard ground to join her son in boy scout adventures, and who has the love and support of her husband. She often talks about her step children and the successful people they have become. No one would guess she has a turtle roaming around on her living room floor during the day, two energetic Labradors, and that she actually knows what an Xbox 360 is. I think she also has birds. There is a lot more to this woman than what the newspapers and other people in the legal community can say about her. This very human side of Judge Leonard makes her an understanding boss. I remember during Thanksgiving, she invited my co-clerk to her house to celebrate the holiday because his family did not reside in Hawai'i. She is a welcoming person, and I think that not many people know this about her because she is also a very private person. Despite all of the importance and responsibility that came with her role as judge, she never ignored that she is working with people who have their own lives that are just as important as those who are appealing a case. During my time as her clerk, I have had family emergencies, her Judicial Assistant has had emergencies, and Judge Leonard herself has had emergencies. She always found a way to accommodate the needs of her fellow co-workers and still kept work rolling smoothly. She struck me as very efficient, and a thoughtful and careful planner.

I hope in your consideration of her as Chief Justice, you will get at least an inkling of the person I know.

Dear Chairman Taniguchi and Judiciary Committee Members:

I am writing to state my opposition to the appointment of Judge Leonard to the position of Chief Justice.

Although Judge Leonard's skills as a legal scholar make her suited for a position on the Intermediate Court of Appeals (or a Justice on the Hawaii Supreme Court), the position of Chief Justice requires much, much more. As the administrative head of the Judiciary, ¹ the new Chief Justice would be expected to manage and lead our State courts through very difficult times. I do not believe Judge Leonard has the skills or work experience to perform these critical functions for the following reasons. ²

<u>Multi-Tasking</u>. The Chief Justice is a position that requires a multi-tasker who can work under stressful conditions, within short deadlines, all the while maintaining the requisite judicial temperament. While I was at Carlsmith Ball, I observed that Judge Leonard tended to work on large cases, but very few at the same time. She was deliberate, cautious and very thorough – valuable traits for a judicial scholar. However, these are not necessarily the only traits needed for the administrative head of the Judiciary.

Management. The Chief Justice is responsible for the assignments of more than 80 judges, overall management of more than 1600 court employees, and overall administration of the Judiciary's many plans, programs and activities statewide. During the period Judge Leonard and I were both at Carlsmith Ball, she did not hold any management positions. She was an associate and eventually became a partner in the firm's litigation department, and her management experience was limited to supervising junior attorneys and support staff who worked with her on a case. Based on my observations of her interactions with peers and subordinates, I would describe her "management style" as authoritarian, inflexible and harsh. While this management style

I base my opinion on my personal observations of her work habits and demeanor during the period we were both at Carlsmith Ball. (I met Judge Leonard when she first joined the firm after graduating from law school. I left that firm in 2003.)

can be effective in some situations, it is often counter-productive in situations where employees are already under pressure.

Leadership. In my experience as a management-side employment attorney, I have observed that the most effective managers are those employees consider their "leaders." Leaders are individuals who can effectively communicate with others, gain their trust, and then inspire and motivate them to do their best. Based on my observations of her career development as an attorney, I do not believe Judge Leonard has had sufficient time in her "judicial career" to develop the skills and experience needed to "lead" the Judiciary. (For example, during the 12-year period we were both at Carlsmith Ball, Judge Leonard was not given any significant leadership positions by the partnership. Her primary role was as "second chair" to lead counsel on the majority of her litigation cases. 3) After having only two or so years on the bench, Judge Leonard may not be perceived as the "leader" of judges and court personnel who have many more years of experience than her.

For all of these reasons, I ask the Committee to think carefully about this nomination.

Dear Senator Taniguchi and Committee Members,

My name is Karen Nakasone, and I have served as a Deputy Public Defender for 14 years – eight years as a trial lawyer in the District, Family, and Circuit courts, and the last six years in the Appellate Division, arguing cases before the Hawai'i Supreme Court and Intermediate Court of Appeals (ICA). Today, however, I write in an individual capacity and not on behalf of the Office of the Public Defender. I also echo and share the concerns raised in the testimony of the Hawai'i Women Lawyers, an organization I am privileged to serve, as a member of its Board of Directors.

As an appellate criminal defense lawyer, I have become familiar with Judge Katherine Leonard in the last two-and-a-half years, since she joined that Court in January 2008. Based on my knowledge and observation of her opinions over the past 2.5 years, in my own cases as well as others, and my personal interaction with her in other contexts, I support Judge Leonard's nomination, as a jurist well-qualified for the post of Chief Justice.

I personally have had eight appeals in which Judge Leonard was a part of the deciding three-judge panel of ICA judges, and as a member of the Appellate Division, I closely follow all criminal decisions issued by the ICA. In my opinion, Judge Leonard's criminal jurisprudence, on the whole, has been methodical, dispassionate, thorough, and mindful of existing precedent. As a criminal defense attorney, practicing before appellate courts that are trending in a direction we would not prefer, I found Judge Leonard's opinions to be measured and reassuring.



On a personal level, I have found Judge Leonard to be very supportive of aspiring women judicial applicants like myself. She unhesitatingly assisted me, when I sought her out for advice and suggestions, at the end of last year, when I was a finalist for an ICA position. Last year, Judge Leonard and I jointly served as speakers for a Hawai'i Women Lawyers Balancing Work and Family Panel which engaged women law students at the University of Hawai'i Richardson School of Law, in informal, frank discussion on this important topic. I was impressed by Judge Leonard's sharing of her own personal struggles to balance the competing demands of motherhood, and the intense work ethic demanded of her, as a partner in one the state's premier law firms.

As a member of the Annual Report Committee of the Access to Justice (ATJ) Commission, I also reviewed a report issued by Judge Leonard, in her capacity as the Chair of the ATJ Hawai'i Rules of Professional Conduct Rule 6.1 Task Force. The report reflected the same high quality and thoroughness that I had seen her demonstrate in her legal opinions.

Chair Taniguchi and Vice-Chair Takamine and Honorable Senators:

Thank you for this opportunity to present testimony regarding the nomination of Judge Leonard to serve as Chief Justice. Before proceeding I would like to clarify for the record that even though I am currently the Chair of the Labor and Employment Section of the Hawai'i State Bar, I am not testifying in that capacity. Rather I am here to Jay testifying as an experienced civil rights and employment rights litigator, who is both a woman and a graduate of the Richardson School of Law. It is also important to clarify that I clerked for two terms at the Intermediate Court of Appeals ["ICA"] for Judge Walter Heen (Ret.). From this vantage point as well as my conversations with other attorneys and community members I oppose Judge Leonard, not as an appellate judge, but as the Chief Justice.

From my experience at the ICA it is clear that the position of Chief Justice calls for one who can ably lead this third equal branch of government. It would be wonderful if this person was a woman and/or a graduate from the Richardson School of Law. However, those attributes are not mandatory. What we need more than anything is to have a Chief Justice who has a vision of what is needed in Hawai'i and its courts, not just someone who can say that they will "follow the rule of law". It is not enough to say that she is a "moderate". We need a Chief Justice who is able by her temperament, legal aptitude, and experience to lead the court system.

I have been a civil rights attorney, concentrating in employment law, since I first opened my law firm in 1986. I have also had the privilege to serve in Hawai'i for two years with the Honolulu EEOC Local Office. I was their Senior Trial Attorney. Nationally, I also had the privilege of being the National Chair for the American Trial Lawyers Association's Employment Section. Locally, I founded the Hawai'i Chapter of the National Employment Lawyers Association and was their President for 3 years and the head of the Legislative Committee for several years. Furthermore, I have written extensively and taught numerous seminars on this issue both locally and nationally. For example, I co-authored a definitive treatise on sexual harassment for a national law resource published by Westlaw, entitled Elizabeth Jubin Fujiwara and Joyce M. Brown, CAUSE OF ACTION FOR POST-ELLERTH/FARAGHER TITLE VII EMPLOYMENT SEXUAL HARASSMENT CLAIMS, 27 COA2d 1 (2005).

Such appropriate Chief Justices were found in CJ Richardson and Chief Justice Moon, who has accepted my invitation to meet today with my Labor and Employment Section of the Hawai'i State Bar regarding his "Reflections". Chief Justice Moon's qualifications before becoming Chief Justice were substantial. [I have taken the liberty to attach Chief Justice Moon's CV, unbeknownst to him]. CJ Richardson's qualifications are, of course, legendary. Unfortunately, Judge Leonard's are not.

Judge Leonard's qualifications appear to be severely lacking for a person nominated and attempting to hold the highest legal position in our state's judiciary. Judge Leonard's legal experience has not demonstrated that she will be an apt leader of the Hawaii Supreme Court. To note, Judge Leonard has very minimal experience as a trial attorney and her judicial career is entirely devoid of any trial bench experience. Additionally, Judge Leonard's two years on the ICA, as merely an associate judge, is no indicator, from my experience at the ICA, that she could adequately lead the entire judiciary system into the next two decades that will be crucial to the development of law for all of Hawai'i's citizens.

At a recent meeting I was privilege to attend with the Civil Court judges in the First Circuit, regarding ongoing issues in the judiciary and what they are facing, it became very clear that we presently have numerous younger and newer judges sitting who are in need of continued, experienced leadership. Judge Leonard does not possess the necessary leadership experience to serve Hawaii in the position of Chief Justice.

There are other outstanding female judges who have the capacity and experience to inspire their colleagues on the Sur reme Court as well as lower court judges, much less judiciary employees, who are also graduates of the Richardson School of Law. These other female judges and/or attorneys, who, by their reputation, demonstrated experience as well as judicial temperament, would better serve the citizens of Hawaii.

Ronald T. Y. Moon Chief Justice – Supreme Court of Hawai'i

(1993 – present)

Ronald T. Y. Moon was sworn-in as Chief Justice of the Supreme Court of Hawai'i on March 31, 1993, after having served as an associate justice for three years. In 2003, Chief Justice Moon was retained to serve a second term of office. Prior to his appointment to the Hawai'i Supreme Court, Chief Justice Moon served as a circuit eccurt judge for eight years.



Chief Justice Moon received his undergraduate degree from Coe College in Cedar Rapids, Iowa and is a 1965 graduate of the University of Iowa School of Law. He served a one-year term as law clerk to then-Chief Judge Martin Pence of the United States District Court for the District of Hawai'i and was subsequently employed with the Office of the Prosecuting Attorney for the City and County of Honolulu from 1966 to 1968. After four years as an associate, Chief Justice Moon became a partner in the law firm of Libkuman, Ventura, Moon & Ayabe. He left private practice in 1982 upon being appointed to the circuit court bench.

Chief Justice Moon has served as an adjunct professor of Pretrial Litigation for the University of Hawaii's Richardson School of Law, as National Secretary of the American Board of Trial Advocates (ABOTA), and as President of the Hawai'i Chapter of ABOTA. As a graduate of the University of Iowa Law School, Chief Justice Moon was featured as one of the first alumni honorees in its *Gallery of Honor* display at the entrance of the Boyd Law Building (1999). In May 2001, Chief Justice Moon received an Honorary Doctor of Laws degree from Coe College in Cedar Rapids, Iowa. Chief Justice Moon also received the Hawai'i State Bar Association's *Golden Gavel Award* (2001); the National Center for State Courts' Distinguished Service Award, one of the Center's highest awards (February 2003) an Honorary Doctor of Laws degree from Inha University (Incheon, Korea; October 2003) for his dedication and efforts to the betterment of the international community; the Korean American Foundation Hawaii's *Light of the Orient* award (January 13, 2008) in recognition of his accomplishments and contributions to the Korean community; the American Bar Association Pursuit of Justice Award (Tort Trial & Ins. Practice Section, 2006); the Pasuquinio Association of Hawaii's award for exemplary service (August 2008); and the Order of Civil Merit "Moran Medal" presented by the Korean Government (November 2008).

Chief Justice Moon is a third-generation Korean-American. His grandparents were among the first wave of Korean immigrants who arrived in Hawai'i in the early 1900's. He is the first Korean-American to become chief justice of any supreme court in the nation.

It is interesting to note that Wilfred C. Tsukiyama, the first chief justice of the 50th state of Hawai'i and the first Japanese American to head a state supreme court (1959-1965), graduated from Coe College in 1923.

Judge Leonard also found time to volunteer as an arbitrator, teach at the University of Hawai'i Law School, serve as an active member of the American Judicature Society, and be the den mother for her son's cub-scout troop.

I personally became acquainted with Judge Leonard when she joined the Intermediate Court of Appeals (ICA) on January 30, 2008. She quickly established herself as an intelligent, analytical, pragmatic, diligent, competent, and productive jurist, and her legal acumen, depth, fluid writing style, and perspectives, informed by experience, added value to the ICA as a whole. Since Judge Leonard's office was next to mine, I consulted with her often to discuss many of the hair-pulling substantive and procedural issues that the ICA wrestles with on a daily basis; I always appreciated her insights.

Based on my experience working with Judge Leonard, I can attest that she is devoted to the law and the administration of justice and is willing to put in the time and attention needed to review the records and transcripts of a case, carefully research the thorny issues raised on appeal, and write an opinion based on the facts and law that clearly conveys to the parties the court's decision. Judge Leonard was always prepared for oral arguments, and she engaged the parties in healthy and respectful dialogue on the issues on appeal. Many of the appellants in cases before the ICA have faced formidable physical, emotional, and social challenges all their lives, and I

Judge Leonard is very serious about her work, but she does not take herself too seriously and often pokes fun at herself. She is eager to learn and always welcomed input and editing suggestions on her draft opinions. She also has intellectual courage and the confidence and "thick skin" needed to make the tough decisions that are a routine part of a supreme-court justice's job. Judge Leonard has willingly and enthusiastically taken on extracurricular activities that enhance the public's perception and understanding of the Judiciary. For example, she participated as a faculty member for several seminars on appellate cases and procedures, served as a judge on moot court panels for UH law students, and developed and taught a creative course on American government for boy scouts working toward their Eagle Scout badge.

Finally, I believe that Judge Leonard has the intellectual, organizational, and leadership skills that are necessary to lead the judicial branch of Hawai'i. She is a team player who cares deeply about the judicial process and the Judiciary. As an ICA judge, Judge Leonard made good suggestions for improving the ICA and its operations. She is a quick study, has good common sense, and seeks advice and ideas before jumping into uncharted waters. I am confident that she will quickly learn the role of and excel as Chief Justice.

Dear Senators:

I am writing to express my views concerning the nomination of Judge Leonard to serve as the next Chief Justice of the State of Hawai'i. Thank you for giving me the opportunity to speak to you.

In brief, my qualifications for expressing these views are as follows: I have been a trial and appellate lawyer since 1971. I have handled (as counsel for either appellants or appellees) over 50 appeals in state and federal court. I have served as special deputy attorney general handling appellate matters for 2 governors, the Justices of the Hawai'i Supreme Court, and the Hawai'i Judicial Selection Commission. I was president of the Hawai'i State Bar Association in 1990-91.

There is much to admire about Judge Leonard. She is a thoughtful and hard-working judge. Her opinions are well-crafted and well-written. She is doing the work I hoped (and expected) when I supported her nomination for her present position.

I am not here today to join those who urge her appointment; nor am I here to join those who oppose her appointment. Doing the former would be easy; doing the latter requires, in fairness, far more information about Judge Leonard than is now known to me from the public record.

The role of Chief Justice is different than the role of any other judge or justice. It is not enough that one be a fine legal thinker and writer who is

dedicated to the rule of law (all of which Judge Leonard certainly appears to be). It is not enough that the Chief Justice be a hard worker (which she also is). Those are prerequisites for a place on the Supreme Court, but they are not sufficient qualifications for a Chief Justice, despite what some have said.

The Chief Justice stands alone in having to fulfill additional important functions in our constitutional system. They are the most important aspects of that job and you should closely examine Judge Leonard's abilities in these areas.

In this area, I do not include the administrative responsibilities which go with the job. Personnel and budgeting decisions are best managed by experts. While in these areas the "buck" may stop on the Chief Justice's desk, experience over the last 40 years has shown that it is not necessary for a Chief Justice—supported by experienced administrators—to be expert in these areas when first appointed. One would, however, expect to see evidence of the ability to become expert in matters of administration and finance, such as Chief Justice Moon has displayed.

Rather, these areas of great importance involve the ability of the Chief Justice (1) to exercise effective leadership over the judges and the judicial staff throughout the state, (2) to command respect from the community at large and other branches of government; (3) to promote and defend the constitutional prerogatives of the judiciary as a co-equal branch of government; and (4) to protect and preserve the judiciary from partisan attacks on its independence.

It is to these matters that you should address your closest attention. Judge Leonard may have all of these qualities, but, if so, she has not had the opportunity to display in any public way the existence, or the depth, of her abilities—or her potential abilities—in these areas.

Because the public record is unclear, I strongly urge you to explore these matters in depth and not act until you are satisfied that Judge Leonard has all of the qualifications the job requires. The people of Hawai'i deserve no less.

The very idea of due process, a critical right for which we as attorneys have fought for hundreds of years, would go out the window with such reliance.

Chair and Honorable Committee Members,

I am submitting this written testimony in opposition to the confirmation of IAC Justice Katherine Leonard as our next Hawaii Supreme Court Justice.

First, my concern was raised when I first heard that Eric Seitz, Esq. objected. Then last night, while we were at a meeting, it was announced to some of us that the Hawaii Bar Association Board of Directors deemed Justice Leonard "unqualified". I am limiting my interpretation of the news strictly that the Bar deems Justice Leonard "unqualified" to be the next Chief Justice of the Hawaii Supreme Court. It certainly should not be a reflection of the current job and assignment she has had since 2007.

Second, watching the early exchange of testimony and questioning, the line of inquiry apparently was not understood by the nominee, and Sen.

Dwight Takamine had to repeatedly prod Justice Leonard to come forth with more details that are pertinent.

Finally, I do not dertermine that Justice Leonard is so qualified that that she should leap frog past her former JC, IAC. There is also another female Associate Justice on the Hawaii Supreme Court, and there were numerous other female Judicial suggestions were varied experiences. To witness this morning's testimony was too much of a feather touch cake walk repeat of her appointment confirmatino for the Associate Justice confirmation which she won in 2007. If I am not mistaken, she was a substitute nominee when another individual withdew. I may be confusing a US Supreme Court nominee with this instance, because the 2007 history is getting more and more vague in the distance.

There, I ask, the nominee IAM Justice Katherine Leonard to withdraw today and permit Gov. Linda Lingle to submit an alternate nominee, a female nominee of equal or better qualification, or permit Gov. Linda Lingle to nominate Supreme Court Associate Justice Mark Rocktenwald

(sic.) and ask for another Supreme Court nomination to replace him.

Perhaps, Justice Katherine Leonard can still be considered for that Associate Justice of the Hawaii Supreme Court.

As the noiminee has indicated in her statement and response, in view and in the interest of Aloha and good will, let a more qualified individual to occupy the Hot Seat. It is unseemly that Gov. Linda Lingle saw fit to permit another individual to leap frog past Associate Justice Mark Rocktenwald (sic.) or to ask AG Mark Bennett to permit his name to be considered by the Judicial Selection Commission.

It is not a matter of what either side wants the Supreme Court to appear as. It is a 20 year, long range appointment that will shape the next generation in the justice and fairness

they can grow to expect. In the grand scheme of things, the Judiciary must be the Third Branch of Government, and it must provide a "level playing field". Fairness and compassion should be extended not just to the victims, but also the accused.

My testimony, again, is in opposition, to the appointment of IAC Justice Katherine Leonard for elevation to the Position of the Chief Justice of the Hawaii Supreme Court.

Honorable Senators Brian T. Taniguchi, Chair, Dwight Y. Takamine, Vice Chair, and Committee Members:

My apologies for this belated testimony. As an attorney, I was taken aback by the action of the Board of the Hawaii State Bar Association, and I feel compelled to inform you that the actions of this Board do not represent either my evaluation of the nominee or that of many of my attorney colleagues.

The very structure of the Judicial Selection Commission insures that it arrives at unbiased recommendations and that the Commission's makeup is comprised of a broad cross section of very well qualified individuals (hand picked by the Senate, the House, the Governor, the HSBA and the sitting Chief justice). The Judicial Selection Commission process results in an extremely thorough, even-handed review of candidates in arriving at the recommended list of qualified candidates to be given to the selection authority. To give additional weight to separate HSBA input also appears to be unfair as they are already involved by selecting two of the nine Judicial Selection Commission members. For the Board of the Hawaii State Bar Association to interject itself in the process in such a biased and unaccountable manner makes a mockery of the legal profession in Hawaii. Even the appearance that there is a glass ceiling in any profession in Hawaii is thoroughly repugnant.

In Governor Lingle's press release announcing her appointment of Katherine Leonard as Chief Justice of the Hawaii Supreme Court, much emphasis was placed on Judge Leonard being the first woman and first graduate of William S. Richardson School of Law to be named to the position. While these are proud accomplishments, the selection of the next Chief Justice of the Hawaii Supreme Court is no ordinary judicial appointment. The selection of the next Chief Justice of the Hawaii Supreme Court will shape not only the future of Hawaii's, third and co-equal branch of government, but will also have an impact on the values that define us as Hawaii, and, as in the past, these values have become an important part of Hawaii's legal history. Therefore, the qualifications of the nominee cannot and should not be focused on these kinds of "firsts" but a broader spectrum of administrative and leadership skills and personal conviction to take on this monumental task.

In his last State of the Judiciary, Chief Justice Moon described the evolution of Hawaii's Judiciary as follows:

"The implementation of the various specialty courts and treatment programs within the Judiciary underscores how far we have evolved from the traditional core mission of judiciaries across the nation, which had been, simply, to adjudicate or resolve disputes brought before its courts. Over the last several decades, the role of state judiciaries has expanded. *Many judiciaries and legislatures across the country have created an effective balance between traditional law enforcement and a problem-solving, restorative-approach*

that rebuilds lives and communities. As a result, the exercise of judicial power and the breadth of its application in today's modern judiciary has extended far beyond adjudication to include diversion programs in which rehabilitation and treatment go hand-in-hand. Unfortunately, budget cuts have resulted in fewer services being available, fewer clients served, and a slow-down in admittance for treatment that could result in program goals not being realized. As the current budget issues continue to threaten the Judiciary's service-oriented structure, we fear that more cuts may force us to completely abandon the modern, service-oriented model."

Information regarding the nominee's understanding of this evolving role of the Judiciary, being able to articulate the future of Hawaii's Judiciary through a demonstration of leadership and administrative skills in overseeing all of the circuits and programs statewide and the role of the Judiciary in perpetuating the values of Hawaii is lacking. There is not enough information about Judge Leonard's background and/or strengths or weaknesses in critical areas that will define the future of the Judiciary. Therefore, we ask the Senate Committee on Judiciary and Government Operations to reject the nomination of Katherine Leonard for Chief Justice of the Hawaii Supreme Court at this time.
